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A CHRISTMAS GIFT JUST FOR YOU

Why do we celebrate Christmas with gift giving? Because the truth about Christmas is about life, now and forever - "...and they shall call His name Immanuel" which translated means, "God with us" – a precious Life indeed!

Part of appreciating a gift is to look at the care taken to wrap it. In this issue

of the *Paraclete*, I point out some of the meticulous care of God's first century wrappings - evidence that authenticates the gift inside.

Jesus is more like the gift of a great fitting pair of gloves than an ornament to admire. You have to "wear Him" to fully appreciate how valuable He is. That's why Jesus Himself said, "I came that they may have life, and have it abundantly"

(John 10:10). "Putting on" this heaven-sent gift of Christmas enables us to live life right now to the fullest.

The problem with most Christmas gifts, though, is that they don't last. We don't either! The gift of life Jesus offers, comes with a guarantee: recipients are promised an eternity with God, beginning now, and continuing after death into eternity.

The Bible says, "The free also says, "all gift of God is eternal life in Christ Jesus our Lord" (Romans 6:23b).

The Bible have sinned" (Romans 3:23) and "the wages of sin is death' (Romans 6:23a).

The gift of Jesus is about love and **hope**: "...God so loved the world that He gave His one and only Son, that whoever believes in Him shall not perish but have eternal life" (John 3:16).

Typically, on Christmas eve or Christmas day a gift under the tree marked with your name becomes yours. When that gift is distributed, you re-

Christmas Choice: Innkeeper or Shepherd?

Christmas was so close to the innkeeper in Bethlehem. Mary and Joseph came to his city, they stood on his doorstep, possibly even in front of his desk. Yet we deduce his preoccupation with business kept him from recognizing the Christ of Christmas. The innkeeper had no time and no room for Jesus.

The shepherds were different. Upon hearing the "good news of great joy" and that "there has been born for you a Savior, who is Christ the Lord" - they hurried into Bethlehem to meet Him. They took time for Jesus. More than that, the shepherds made room for Jesus in their hearts and "spread the Word concerning...this child" (Luke 2:10-11, 17).

The week before Christmas was hectic. Dad and mom were frantic, and nerves reached the breaking point more than once. The little daughter seemed to be in the way wherever she went.

Finally, she was hurried up to bed and as she knelt to pray, the feverish excitement evidently mixed her up and she said, "Jesus, forgive us our Christmases, as we forgive those who Christmas against us!"



Are the Bible Records of Jesus True?

The basis for trusting the Gospel records about Jesus is twofold: 1) Do the records have integrity? and 2) Are they actual history?

Ancient writings with the earliest and greatest number of hand-written manuscripts have the greatest integrity. Most ancient works have fewer than 100 manuscripts, a scant few have several hundred. The New Testament, in stark contrast, has over 24,000.

Most documents from antiquity have no manuscripts within even one thou-



sand years of the time of writing. This allows for the accumulation of copying errors. Again, consider that some New Testament manuscripts are within twenty-five years of the original composition; all are within 100 years of authorship.

The integrity of the eyewitness Gospel records of Jesus is head and shoulders above all other ancient writings.

Archaeological discoveries often confirm the historical reliability of people, places, and events mentioned in the writings. No other writing is even close to the historical confirmation of the New Testament. Evidence for people (e.g. Caiaphas, Pontius Pilate), places (e.g. Capernaum Synagogue, Peter's home, pools of Bethesda and Siloam), and events (crucifixion with nails) have verified the truthfulness of New Testament history.



Evidence from archaeology: Although skeptics dismissed the use of nails for crucifixion in Jesus' time, an excavation in Jerusalem discovered the ankle and foot bones (with embedded nail) of a crucifixion victim, dated close to the time of Jesus' death.

The Gospel records of Jesus have the greatest integrity and are the most historically reliable writings of antiquity, bar none.

The transmission to us over the centuries has been so good that when we read about Jesus in our Bible today, we can be assured we are reading what the eyewitness apostles saw, heard, and wrote in the first century!


What Are the Odds?

It has been stated that there are at least 456 Old Testament prophecies which pertain to a future person. For example, this person would be born in Bethlehem of a virgin; would be betrayed for thirty pieces of silver by a friend; crucified among criminals;

hands and feet would be pierced; none of his bones would be broken; and he would be resurrected from the dead. The Old Testament prophecies were clearly focused on Jesus for only He fulfilled these and the hundreds of criteria.

How do skeptics respond? First, they erroneously claim the prophecies must have been written after the time of Jesus, and therefore, fulfill themselves. However, the Septuagint (Greek translation of the Old Testament) was translated 250 years before the birth of Jesus and these same prophecies are included there. Furthermore, the recently-discovered **Dead Sea Scrolls**, which date 150-200 years before Jesus lived, also include the prophecies.

Second, the most common objection is that the fulfillment was coincidence or chance. Science and mathematics professor Peter Stoner has estimated a reasonable probability that one man might have coincidentally fulfilled just 8 of these 456 prophecies is one chance in 10¹⁷. How can we understand that?



Take 10¹⁷ silver dollars, which would cover the entire state of Texas two feet deep. Mark one and stir the whole mass thoroughly. Blindfold a man, and send him throughout Texas, instructing him to pick up only one silver dollar, and hope that one coin would be the marked one. This is the same chance the prophets would have had of writing these eight prophecies and having them all come true in any one man. (Peter W. Stoner, Science Speaks, Moody Press, p. 107.)

These odds don't account for the other 448 prophecies, also fulfilled in the person of Jesus!

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
